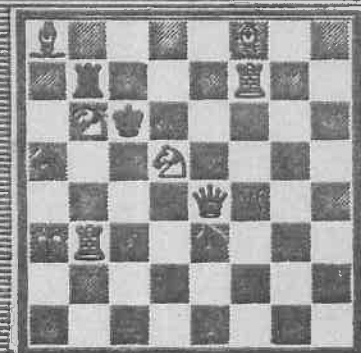

Attractions include a swimming pool, skating rink, cinema and for the energetic, an indoor running track. (Myself, preferring Egypt, am more attracted by the presence of the RAF Hospital = plenty of nurses.) I look forward to seeing you all there. Let's give Robin Rowe, the organizer, a big head ache by making this years championships a record both in terms of size and success.

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## A LETTER FROM THE SECRETARY

1. RAFC/BAOR Championships were held during the week preceeding Easter. The report is not yet to hand, but will be published(hopefully in the next edition). Also the RAF Cyprus championships were held recently- again a report is not yet to hand.
2. The Combined Services Chess Championships will be held at RAF Cosford by the kind permission of Group Captain W.M.Smedley OBE, C.ENG, ATRAC, RAF, during the period 11-16 October inclusive. The enthusiastic committee at Cosford will be striving to ensure that the high standard set by Frank Salt at Lindholme is maintained. We are again hoping to have Flt Sgt Jack Elliott as Controller; things would not be the same with-out him. The entry form (at the back of this issue) should be sent to the Officer i/c RAF Cosford Chess Club to arrive by the 1st September 1972. It is hoped to arrange a Simultaneous Display by a British Master on one of the spare evenings.
3. The match, Combined Services v. Middlesex II, finished with the final score as MIDDX II 12 COMB SERV 8
4. The 1971-72 season is drawing to a close, only the Wiltshire fixture remaining. A disappointing feature was our failure to obtain official recognition resulting in the understandable reluctance of Members to travel long distances to attend fixtures. With this in mind, the Secretary is arranging a shorter fixture list for the 1972-73 season with more emphasis on regional venues. It is worth noting that at present there are no Members stationed in the immediate London area. Adastral House is therefore for the time being no longer a central meeting point.
5. "Regional Chess" appears to be popular, more Station teams are entering local leagues- why not give the Editor a write up on your activities. It should be stressed however that RAF Chess Club fixtures take priority for obvious reasons. Local organizers are requested to keep an eye on the parent Club's fixture list and to arrange their matches accordingly. This will prevent an unfortunate occurrence which caused the late cancellation of the Army/RAF "needle" match recently. Apart from the cancellation of travel arrangements - some Army players were

travelling from as far as Scotland and Germany - it was a bitter disappointment to find out that one cause of so many Members not accepting the invitation to represent the RAF Chess Club was a regional match scheduled for the same day.

6. It is fair to say that additional factors against this ill fated match were the Army's delay in notification of the venue and that Sandhurst proved to be "off beam" for the majority of those invited. These "errors" on the admin side will not be repeated.
7. The first match of the new season will be versus the Battle of Britain Competitors in London on 15th Sept. 1972 over ten boards. Anyone interested please drop me a line by mid August. (to the Secretary) A complete fixture list will appear in the next publication.
8. There was a mistake in the last publication which has caused me some embarrassment. In the questionnaire "Ability to browse through books" should have been "Opportunity to browse ...." (I take full responsibility for this boob, Ed.)

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As Peter remarked in a P.S. to the above news-letter, "Most of us have the ability, few the opportunity".

- (b) A fantastic blunder, even though it looks the most natural reply. Correct is 49. K-R2 as now when Black takes the rook, there is'nt a check. e.g. 49. K-R2 K-B5 50. RxR RxR 51. R-QN8 winning.

A letter has arrived from Frank Haynes (now at Melksham) in which he encloses a few of his recent postal games. In fact all three games are losses. He states that "they are usually the most instructive". I agree wholeheartedly with that statement. Most of, however, aren't brave enough to have such losses published. Of all the books that have been published on chess under the heading of "My Best Games of Chess" or similar title, I only can remember one grandmaster publishing his own losses. In "Chess Fundamentals", Capablanca printed at least three of his losses. He was perhaps the greatest ever, so don't be shy readers, send what you consider to be your most instructive game in to me and let us all learn something.

HOVE CHESS CONGRESS - "MAJOR" TOURNAMENT

5th - 12th APRIL 1972

A letter from Peter Putt, has arrived in which he tells me that he joined the Bognor Regis Chess Club in January. Although the season was half completed his enthusiasm enabled him to get in 28 games before the season ended. This magnificent effort meant that he finished 2nd in their Club Championship. The final result being:

1st W.R.BRYSON p30 w22 d2 l6 pts23  
2nd P.F.PUTT p28 w21 d1 l6 pts21½

Congratulations Peter. His "Chess Widowed Wife" ALSO (wish mine would) allowed him to go and play in the above tournament. Here again Peter finished runner-up. Two very interesting positions from his games in the tourney I give below.

When setting up the positions, White has CAPITAL LETTERS and black the small letters.

Round 3. White - W.W.TATUM Black - P.PUTT

The position after Blacks 39th move was as follows:

8; K1P4r; P4B2; 2nN3p; 1P1p2R1; 1p2p3; pkp5; 2b5;  
Peter writes: "Black, coasting to an easy win - three pawns to the good - thought that White had given up the struggle when in the above position he played 40. RxP. However the move played immediately before the time check was not a blunder nor was it stupid."

White obviously had hoped the game might have continued as follows: 40. RxP PxR 41. BxPch K-N1 42. N-B6ch K-R1 43. N-K8dis ch K-N1 44. N-B6ch with a draw by perpetual check. However Pete was not going to have ½ point snatched

from his grasp. Here is how he "kept his cool" (as they say today) and won a full point. The game continued after 40. RxP as follows: 40. .... PxR 41. BxPch P-B3 (the only move to avoid the draw.) 42. Pxpch K-N1 43. BxN R-K7 44. B-K3 P-R6 45. N-B3 R-B746B-Q4 B-B4 47. BxB RxN 48. B-Q4 R-Q6 49. B-K5 P-R7 50. K-N2 R-Q8 51. Resigns.

A second interesting position from the same tourney came in Round 5.

43. B-B8ch K-R4 44. R-R7ch K-N4 45. B-Q7mate.

A neat finish and an omen to expect "things" from Peter in next years championships.

(f) I was looking at 39. .... QxR 40. R-B7 QxR 41. QxQch with a clear win. If 39. K-N2 RxNch 40. KxR Q-B7ch with a perpetual. I can't afford to forget that Black got a mate unless I get on with it. However his next move is CATASROPHIC.
